Advocacy at its finest

Tennesse self-advocate inspires Text-911 bill, presents to legislators

In the world of advocacy, each person has a story to tell. Arc Tennessee staff member and Chattanooga resident, Molly Ridgeway Anderson, has an incredible story that's both nerve-racking and inspiring change when it comes to emergency resources here in Tennessee.

The 25 year-old Chattanooga resident recently graduated with a Master's degree from George Washington University. Her thesis project was unlike any other, to propose and advocate for a Text-911 bill to the Tennessee Legislative Assembly.

"I was diagnosed with Apraxia at 18 months old. Apraxia is a speech disorder that impacts my ability to speak. I can hear perfectly, yet I'm not able to verbally communicate. When I was a senior in high school, I had my first wreck in my hometown of Florence, Alabama. Thankfully my car had Onstar which detects an accident and calls 911 automatically."

This experience made Molly realize that Texting 911 could be a valuable resource to any community, especially individuals with disabilities, domestic violence victims, people in medical distress, and many more.

Fast forward six years and Molly experienced another car accident. This time with a funeral van!

"Although the dead guy was okay, the casket did get dented," Molly says laughingly. "But the fact remained, I still couldn't call 911 for help."

Like many individuals with Apraxia, American Sign Language is a essential way of communicating.

"When I face-timed my husband, he could not understand me because I was balling and my signs were everywhere. A kind bystander stopped and called 911." Although many deaf and hard of hearing individuals use video-relay services, Molly doesn't because she can hear.

"It's so scary when I can't get help during an emergency. And when I do call 911, and I'm not able to be heard, emergency responders default to sending every emergency vehicle because they do not know my specific need."

So advocating for the Text 911 bill has become a family affair. Molly's husband Josh and baby-on-the-way have accompanied Molly to Nashville to present the full Tennessee Senate.

House Bill 173/Senate Bill 182 is sponsored by Sen. Becky Massey and Rep. Eddie Mannis. It has already passed the full Senate and is seeking approval from the House Finance Committee and full House in April 2021.

In October 2020, Heidi Haines was selected as the new Executive Director for The Arc Tennessee. After a nation wide search, Haines moved cross-country during a pandemic to take the lead of Tennessee's state chapter.

"My family and I came to the Great Smoky Mountains on vacation a few years ago after the The Arc National Convention in Nashville. We loved Tennessee and when the ED position became open, all of us were excited about the potential of moving here," says Haines.

For the past nine years, Heidi served as Director of Advocacy for The Arc Colorado, as well as an advisor for Self Advocates Becoming Empowered (SABE). SABE is a national self-advocacy organization for people with developmental disabilities.

Heidi is a graduate of the National Leadership Consortium on Developmental Disabilities at the University of Delaware Advance Leadership Institute and a 2016 graduate of the William & Mary Law Institute of Special Education

Advocacy. For two years, she also served as a technology navigation fellow for The Arc of United States.

Apart from leadership responsibilities, Heidi has jumped in ready to swim.

"There's been so many changes in the last year for The Arc TN staff alone. We saw many great people retire or

The Arc Tennessee is launching a Sept. 11th Remembrance Project to honor Nashville First Responders. The project kicks off with an art contest for Tennessee self-advocates.

Winners will have their artwork featured on the front cover of 2,977 cards printed for Nashville First Responders. One card in honor of each life lost on Sept. 11th, 2001.

Project goal: build community resiliency after a hard year and show that everyone, including individuals with disabilities, have the ability to contribute to the community.

What we need: Works of art that reflect unity, resiliency, respect, appreciation and/or service. Self-advocates are encouraged to use any type of materials (paint, pastels, markers, etc.). Get creative! Make a masterpiece that inspires and reminds us that we're all in this together!

Who can participate: Any individual with a disability in Tennessee can submit a design. You **do not** have to be a member of The Arc TN or People First to participate.

Individuals can submit more than one design.

**Please keep your original artwork. If your design is selected, the original artwork will be needed to create the cards.

Deadline to submit: Thursday, April 22nd, 2021

The People First Advisory Council will review and choose the top artwork entries in May. Winners will be notified by May 20th. Artists name and county will be listed on the inside of each card. Cards will be hand-written by volunteer groups and mailed to first responders the week of Sept. 11th, 2021.

The Arc Davidson County & Greater Nashville

In September 2020, The Arc Davidson County & Greater Nashville was awarded \$200,000 to help Wilson, Davidson, Rutherford, Cheatham, Sumner, Williamson, and Robertson county individuals with disabilities and families with a family member with a disability who have been affected by COVID-19. Each individual was awarded up to \$1,000.00 in assistance to help with paying rent/mortgage, utilities, and / or computer equipment. They were able to assist a total of 204 individuals.


