The Family Engagement in Special Education (FESPED) team recently became the newest partner with the Tennessee Technical Assistance Network (TN-TAN). TN-TAN provides school districts, administrators, educators, and families access to high-quality training, resources, and supports designed to improve outcomes for students with disabilities, ages 3-22. <u>https://tn-tan.tnedu.gov/</u>

The Family Engagement program is excited to be part of such an amazing team of providers. Along with the other TN-TAN partners, the network includes support in the areas of intensive behavior, preschool, autism, assistive technology, post-secondary transition, family engagement, and Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI2) for academics and behavior. The FESPED project, through The Arc Tennessee, has been working with the Tennessee Department of Education since 2018 to increase family engagement in special education to improve outcomes for students with disabilities. The FESPED work primarily focuses on two groups – educators and families.

The goal for FESPED is to support schools through training, planning opportunities, and professional development that will help strategize ways to empower families to be more involved in their child's special education journey. Our services are free and meant to lighten the load for districts and schools. FESPED can help educators better engage families to improve student outcomes and APR Indicator 8 (Parental Involvement) scores.

In addition, FESPED empowers parents and caregivers to increase family engagement in special education. The

Theresa Smisor covers the Memphis/Shelby County area. Theresa is a passionate and outspoken advocate for those with which she works. She works tirelessly to help people live their best life and isn't afraid to challenge the status quo.

Heather: How long have you worked at The Arc TN?

Theresa: I have worked at The Arc for almost 12 years.

Heather: What do you love most about your job?

Theresa: What I love most about my job is fighting along side, and fighting for people whose voice is not being heard.

Heather: Do you have any strategies for dealing with stress at work?

Theresa: My strategy for dealing with stress at work is to turn up my car stereo to full blast, play a lot of Queen and Foreigner, and then drive with the windows down.

Heather: What do you think our future looks like as a team?

Theresa: I think we have a great team at The Arc, and therefore that will impact our future, and our ability to help shape it into a positive one

Heather: What is something surprising that not many people know about you?

Theresa: Something that people may not know about mel'm a huge science nerd and love reading scientific studies and articles on general biology, genetics, and physics.

Tracey Cunningham provides advocacy for Jackson and many of the rural counties in West. She is a hard worker who demonstrates self-reliance and diligence in her work. Tracey: 14 years

Heather: What do you love most about your job?

Tracey: Meeting new people

Heather: Do you have any strategies for dealing with stress at work?

Tracey: Getting advice from co-workers, taking time off, going out of town/mini vacation

Heather: What do you think our future looks like as a team?

Tracey: We work hard and we work well as a team, so the future has no choice but to be GREAT! The Arc has grown tremendously, obtaining new contracts. This comes from hard work and dedication from all involved.

Heather: What is something surprising that not many people know about you?

Tracey: I love to read - I enjoy curling up with a good book.

Susan Bryant works with families and self-advocates in the Memphis area to educate them on their rights and how to advocate for what they want. As a parent to a child with disabilities, she shows an unwavering commitment to helping families learn and shows a genuine belief in the importance of their message.

#### Heather: How long have you worked at The Arc TN? Susan: Just over 5 years

#### Heather: What do you love most about your job?

Susan: The opportunity to connect with self-advocates, students, and their families who often share valuable resources and support with me in spite of the fact that they have reached out to request assistance from me as an advocate. I learn so many new ways to meet challenges from folks who are living good lives and embrace their challenges with courage and determination.

Heather: Do you have any strategies for dealing with stress at work?

Susan: I remind myself that each day a step in the right direction is enough, and the timeline for completion of a task is as individualized as the folks for whom I'm advocating.

Heather: What do you think our future looks like as a team?

Susan: Our future is both busy and bright, even thought the demand is often greater than the supply. (Maybe a backwards way of defining job security!)

Heather: What is something surprising that not many people know about you?

Susan: I am not a coffee drinker-not very interesting or surprising, but all I could think of at this point.

they chose after high school. For students with disabilities, this meant creating individualized transition plans and teaching students how to self-advocate with the goal of equipping them with the skills and confidence to enter the workforce.

I look forward to what Dr. Faulkner brings to the table in terms of educational issues and advocacy. From her own experience working in education, as well as parenting an individual with a disability, she has a deep understanding of how various issues impact the life of individuals with IDD.

Since her older son's diagnosis of autism 27 years ago, Dr. Faulkner has looked to serve individuals with disabilities, and for many years, did so in the public education arena. For the last five years, she has served on the board of directors for Developmental Services of Dickson County. Her son and she were part of the Dickson All-Abilities Inclusion Team, which resulted from the Vanderbilt Kennedy Center Community Involvement Grant. She is eager to be a part of The Arc Tennessee because she has seen firsthand the power and importance of full inclusion.

Dr. Faulkner holds a Bachelor of Science degree from University of Tennessee at Knoxville. She earned a Master's degree in Administration and Supervision from Tennessee State University, and a doctorate in Organizational Leadership from Trevecca Nazarene University. She is the proud parent of two sons and enjoys traveling, reading, and watching college football.
