Executive Summary

If I had to choose one word to describe this past year at **The Arc Tennessee**, it would be "success!" One of our goals was to expand our outreach, so more people would know who we are and how we support individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). With the hiring of a new Director of Communications and Public Awareness came a new perspective and some fresh ideas. Since Wil Herrmuth has been in his role, our newsletter subscribers now total 2,584, which is a seven percent increase, and our Facebook followers **grew by an impressive 10 percent to 5,286**.

Our number of subscribers and social media presence no doubt contributed to the success of our annual Tennessee Disability MegaConference. This year's conference welcomed **240 attendees** from across the state and **57 exhibitors**. The two-day event featured keynotes from experts in the field of disability, **45 breakout sessions**, and an awards ceremony. Without months of hard work by our staff and generous sponsors, this event would not have been possible.

For 29 years, the Mutual of America Foundation has celebrated the achievements of nonprofits across the country with their Community Partnership Awards. After receiving over 1,400 applications, Mutual of America recognized six nonprofits for their outstanding contributions to society, and our **TN Center for Decision-Making Support (CDMS)** was one of them.

Along with program director Penny Johnson and transition specialist Breanna Atwell, I traveled to New York City to accept the 2024 Social Impact Award and **a check for \$50,000**. While this was a highlight of the year, it underscores the importance of the work being done by CDMS. This year saw a **43% increase** in one-on-one consultations, and a **100% increase** in participation at transition and resource fairs. CDMS was founded on the belief that individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities have the right to make their own decisions whenever possible, and the message is spreading.

Most of our successes do not receive the national spotlight, but they are just as important because they improve the lives of people with disabilities. The Arc Tennessee employs advocates across the state to intervene when someone with IDD experiences crisis – and this year our **advocates helped 451** individuals, an increase of 27 percent.


Family Engagement in Special Education connects families and schools so that students with disabilities receive the support they need to be successful. For the 2024-25 fiscal year, this team provided over **593 mentoring sessions** to families and schools, which is a **30% increase** from the previous year.

The **PASS (Personal Assistance, Supports, and Services)** program allows people with IDD to direct their own personal care, so they can be more fully integrated within the community, while our **People First Tennessee** program empowers people with disabilities to be self-advocates. This program is special because it is run by people with disabilities for people with disabilities.

With so many life-changing programs, it is imperative that The Arc Tennessee thrives, and we can only do that if we are financially stable and fiscally responsible. For the **first time since FY 2020-21**, we are ending the year with a positive total net revenue. The guidance of our executive committee, finance committee, and fiscal manager has made this possible.

We have turned a corner and are headed in a new direction. This annual report is a celebration of all we have accomplished and a commitment to the community we serve and represent.

The Arc Tennessee has continued to expand its digital footprint as proven by our online newsletter reaching 2,584 subscribers, marking a seven percent growth year-over-year, while our Facebook followers grew by an impressive 10 percent to 5,286.

2025 MegaConference

Tennessee Disability MegaConference was held May 22–23, 2025, at the Loews Vanderbilt Hotel in Nashville under the theme "Past Reflections, Future Directions." The event brought together over 325 individuals – self-advocates, family members, professionals, and community leaders – from across the state. MegaConference 2025 offered two days of powerful keynote addresses, multiple breakout sessions, and dynamic networking opportunities.

We hope to carry that powerful energy forward into the next year. The reflections we shared and the future we envisioned together affirm that **real progress** happens when people with disabilities are **leading the way** and **fueled by support**, **respect**, and **opportunity**!

Advocacy Team

The **Advocacy Team** believes in showing up, speaking out, and standing beside people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families as they navigate complex systems. Over the past year, we **provided direct support to 451 individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities across the state, helping them navigate challenges and access the services they need to thrive.**

Through meaningful partnerships – like **our collaboration with Family Voices of Tennessee** – we led statewide trainings to help individuals and families understand the Employment and Community First (ECF) CHOICES enrollment process and ensure families were informed and equipped to make the best decisions for their future.

Our team also **worked to equip** Independent Support Coordinators (ISCs), providers and advocates with the tools to navigate complex TennCare redeterminations that saw many of the 1915(c) waiver recipients being wrongly disenrolled from TennCare and the waiver. This urgent issue allowed us to partner with the Department of Disability and Aging (DDA) and Tennessee Justice Center to ensure no one was left behind.

This year, we had the opportunity to **collaborate with The Kelsey and DDA** to explore innovative, inclusive housing models and co-host a critical housing conversation at the 2025 MegaConference. This opened the door to DDA agreeing to be a keynote speaker – headlined by **Commissioner Turner**, who kicked off their keynote in front of a packed house that included over 10 members of the DDA leadership team. Following the event, DDA committed to continuing this partnership with advocacy, so we can **amplify the voices of self-advocates at the decision-making table**.

In addition to systems change, our Advocacy Team addressed urgent individual needs, **providing direct advocacy for 108 behavior-related referrals and 73 legal or police interaction cases**, many of which stemmed from gaps in needed services. We helped individuals access the appropriate supports, assert their rights, and find stability.

Whether it's through training, policy engagement, or one-on-one advocacy, the Advocacy Team continues to be a trusted champion for people with disabilities and their families as **we make sure every voice is heard and every person is empowered**.

Through grant support from the Department of Disability and Aging, The Arc Tennessee supports four individuals with developmental disabilities to self-direct their supports and services. Individuals in the PERSONAL ASSISTANCE, SERVICE, AND SUPPORTS (PASS) Program do not receive other home or community-based services but need supports to live independently in the community. We support these individuals to manage their budgets, pay their support staff, and find creative technology solutions that increase their quality of life and allow them to maintain an independent lifestyle.

Family Engagement in Special Education

The **Family Engagement in Special Education** program is excited to be part of such an amazing team of providers. Along with the other TN-TAN partners, the network includes support in the areas of intensive behavior, preschool, autism, assistive technology, post-secondary transition, family engagement, and Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI2) for academics and behavior.

The FESPED project, through The Arc Tennessee, has been working with the Tennessee Department of Education since 2018 to increase family engagement in special education to improve outcomes for students with disabilities. The FESPED work primarily focuses on two groups – educators and families.

The goal for FESPED is to support schools through training, planning opportunities, and professional development that will help strategize ways to empower families to be more involved in their child's special education journey. Our services are free and meant to lighten the load for districts and schools.

FESPED also empowers parents and caregivers to increase family engagement in special education. The team **provides family** support groups, educational events, resource fairs and other special education resources for families around the state.

Federal law assures that every child is entitled to a free and appropriate public education. However, sometimes students with disabilities and their families face challenges navigating the special education system. The Tennessee Department of Education contracts with The Arc Tennessee to provide services and supports to help prepare young adults for life after high school.

TN Center for Decision-Making Support

The **TN Center for Decision-Making Support (CDMS)** had a milestone year by expanding services, reaching more people, and earning state and national recognition.

State Investment: A Governor's budget grant funded a full-time Transition Coordinator, expanded travel for trainings, and certified three new LifeCourse Ambassadors.

Major Impact: We recorded 48% more presentations, 43% more one-on-one consultations, and doubled our participation at transition and resource fairs.

Broader Reach: CDMS expanded beyond disability services to support individuals with Alzheimer's, dementia, and mental health needs, building new partnerships statewide.

State Influence: Program director Penny Johnson was appointed to the Tennessee Conservatorship Taskforce to help reform laws and practices.

National Stage: Our team served as keynote speaker and presenter at the 2025 LifeCourse Nexus Annual Showcase.

Top Honor: We won one of only four Mutual of America Social Impact Awards out of 1,400 applicants nationwide, earning a grant, national publicity, and an unforgettable trip to New York City.

The CDMS team is deeply grateful for the opportunity to serve Tennessee and looks forward to building on this momentum in the year ahead.



People First Tennessee

People First Tennessee is a grassroots group led by people with disabilities who are passionate about making sure their voices are heard. It was started by self-advocates who wanted real change — and today, it's a growing movement for equality, inclusion, and independence.

Public Policy Advocacy

Advocacy has always been, and will continue to be, the heart of The Arc Tennessee.

Whether we are defending human and civil rights through public policy efforts, partnering with key stakeholders to create change involving how services are delivered, or addressing an individual's personal needs, the goal is always to improve the quality of life for people with IDD and their families.

During the past year, our legislative committee **tracked 83 bills**, **sent seven Action Alerts**, and **held 13 meetings** to ensure that The Arc Tennessee was leading the advocacy conversation while staying up to date with the latest developments from the Tennessee State Capitol.



SB1178/HB718

SB1073/HB861


Requires within 10 days of an IEP meeting that LEAs provide families with a copy of all evaluations and assessments administered for the purpose of the IEP

Allows for the expansion of another residential facility for people with disabilities




